- 1. A prophet who prophesied after the seventy years the Jews spent in captivity in Babylon.
- 2. Zechariah, Haggai, and Malachi
- 3. King Cyrus of Persia. He brought the Babylonian Empire to an end and gave a royal edict in 538 B.C., which permitted the Jews to return to their homeland.
- 4. About 50,000 Jews returned.

discuss / consider

- 1. Re-read Zechariah 1:7-11. The vision of the horses and riders was the first of Zechariah's eight prophetic visions. The rider standing astride the red horse was the Angel of the Lord. He was in the midst of the myrtle trees in the valley. These trees represent the present status of Israel, under Gentile domination of the earth. Discuss the present status of Israel.
- 2. The good news comes in the second half of this vision. The Lord knows and cares about Israel, and is only allowing the Gentile nations to afflict Israel at the present time in order to bring them to the point where they will return to the Lord. And they will! The Lord will return to deliver the nation of Israel from the domination of Gentile nations. Consider the future of Israel, especially as you look at their status today.

challenge

Israel had turned away from the Lord and had gone their own way, but God still loved them. He pleaded with them and promised them if they would return to Him, He would return to them. Are you out of fellowship with the Lord? Do you know in your heart that things are not right between you and the Lord? Do you want to know the peace and joy of close fellowship with the Lord once again? You can. Return to the Lord and He will return to you.

memorize

"Return to Me,' says the Lord, 'and I will return to you…so they returned." Zechariah 1:3, 6

"I am returning to Jerusalem with mercy. My house shall be built in it. The Lord will again comfort Zion, and will again choose Jerusalem." Zechariah 1:16-17

- 1. They rebuilt the altar of the Lord and restarted the sacrifices.
- 2. Solomon's temple had been destroyed by the Babylonians under Nebuchadnezzar in 586 B.C. Upon their return, the Jews re-laid the foundation of the temple.
- 3. They became discouraged because of threats from the surrounding pagan provinces as well as pressure from the Persian government. They stopped building the temple and spent all their time building their own houses.
- 4. God stirred the hearts of the prophets Haggai and Zechariah to rise up and motivate the people to get back to the work of rebuilding the temple of the Lord.
- 5. It was quite a year of prophetic ministry. All of Haggai's sermons were given during that year and this was the year that Zechariah had his prophetic visions.
- 6. He preached four fiery sermons in a four-month period.
- 7. All eight of Zechariah's visions of encouragement came after Haggai's four sermons of exhortation. All eight came on the same night.

discuss / consider

1. The second prophetic vision of Zechariah is recorded in Chapter 1:18-19. In the vision, Zechariah sees four animal horns representing the power of nations (1:21). The four horns represent Gentile powers that have attacked, dominated and scattered Judah, Israel, and Jerusalem throughout history.

Specifically, they are the four world empires as seen in Daniel 2. In line with Daniel 2, Zechariah 1 represents the Babylonian Empire, the Persian Empire, the Greek Empire, and the Roman Empire, including the end-time phase of Rome. God used all of these powers to discipline, rebuke and purge His people Israel until the end-time when the nation of Israel returns to the Lord. Marvel at the revelation of Scripture and its confirmation throughout the Bible of God's word!

2. Regardless of the evil and sinful actions of the Gentile powers (the horns), God is able to work all things together for His good purposes. But God also holds all nations responsible for their evil actions. In the vision of the craftsmen (Zechariah 1: 20-21), God uses craftsmen to destroy the horns, the four world empires. In Daniel 2 the fourth craftsman is the world empire and kingdom of our Lord Himself, which will be set up here when the Lord returns. See Daniel 2:44. Again, marvel at the revelation and confirmation of scripture!

challenge

As God used horns to discipline His people, so God may use ungodly powers in our lives. Is God using someone or something right now to discipline you? Learn the lesson that God has for you.

memorize

"The craftsmen are coming to cast out the horns of the nations that scattered the land of Judah." Zechariah 1:21

The Third Prophetic Vision of Zechariah - The Vision of the Surveyor Zechariah 2:1-13

- 1. When the Jews returned from their captivity in Babylon in 538 B.C., we know that Zechariah was among those who returned because he is mentioned in Nehemiah 12:16 as one of the priests who returned.
- 2. Haggai was an older prophet and probably spent most of his life in Babylon during the seventy-year captivity. Zechariah, a contemporary of Haggai, was a younger man who returned to Jerusalem in his youth.
- 3. To exhort and encourage and to motivate the people to finish the job of rebuilding the Lord's temple.
- 4. That God uses both the older generation and the younger generation to exhort and encourage His people in all areas of ministry.

discuss / consider

1. In Zechariah's third prophetic vision, in 520 B.C., he sees a surveyor measuring Jerusalem. Jerusalem will be rebuilt and become much larger than it was before. This vision was partially fulfilled when the temple was completed four years after the vision, and it would be another seventy-five years before Nehemiah returned to rebuild the wall. When will this vision be finally fulfilled? When Jerusalem becomes a city of peace and the Lord will be the glory in her midst. When will this occur? When the Lord comes back to set up His kingdom here on this earth, with Jerusalem as His headquarters. (Zechariah 2:4-5, 12)

Think of Jerusalem at peace!

2. Consider Jerusalem, a holy city, a city for all people in the future. When the Lord Jesus returns to set up His kingdom on this earth, all the believing nations of that day will be part of the glorious kingdom of Christ. There will be no so-called Palestinian problem then. Think of it!

challenge

The Lord promises to deal personally in judgment with any nation that goes against His people. God's protective care for His people is true for the nation of Israel. But it's also true for you if you are a believer. "He who touches you touches the apple of His eye." Zechariah 2:8

memorize

"Ierusalem will be inhabited as towns without walls." Zechariah 2:4-5

- 2. All eight visions came to Zechariah during one night.
- 3. To encourage the remnant of Jews who had returned from the seventy-year captivity in Babylon.
- 4. The focus is on internal cleansing. Israel will be cleansed and restored to the position that God originally intended for His people.
- 5. God's original intent for His people was to be a kingdom of priests. Israel lost this position because of sin and disobedience.

discuss / consider

- 1. Joshua, the cleansed high priest, is given a renewed commission. Remember, Joshua stands for the whole nation of Israel and the future restored nation as a kingdom of priests. Remember, too, that the brand plucked from the fire was the entire remnant who had returned from the fires of the Babylonian captivity. Consider God's great love for His people, Israel. Are you a brand plucked from the fire? Consider God's great love for His people, believers.
- 2. Refer to Zechariah 3:8-9. Note the three messianic titles of the Lord Jesus in these verses: "My Servant," "the BRANCH," and "the stone." Now read Isaiah 52:13; Isaiah 11:1; and Daniel 2:44-45. Then consider the wonderful blessing awaiting Israel in the future with the presence of a perfect King and a perfect Kingdom. Will you be there, too? Be sure of your salvation and eternal destiny.

challenge

Are you still dressed in filthy rags? As Joshua the high priest, representing the nation of Israel, was a brand plucked from the fire, so we who have trusted Christ are brands plucked from the fires of hell. Like Joshua when cleansed, our filthy garments are removed and the robes of Christ's righteousness are given to us. Are you a priest of the most high God, with Christ as your High Priest? See Isaiah 64:6 and 1 Peter 2:9.

memorize

"Then he showed me Joshua the high priest standing before the Angel of the Lord, and Satan standing at his right hand to oppose him."

doctrinal / teaching points 1. At the time of the end, Israel will be a witness to the light of the world.

- 1. The Jews had returned from their seventy-year captivity in Babylon, and they had started to rebuild the temple in Jerusalem. However the temple still was not finished after a delay of about fifteen years.
- 2. The people had become discouraged when they were threatened by the enemies in the surrounding Persian provinces.
- 3. In order to encourage and motivate the people to finish the job of rebuilding the house of the Lord.
- 4. The people needed to recognize that God was in control and as long as they looked to the Lord, He would enable them to do the work of rebuilding the temple. See Zechariah 4:6.
- 5. Zerubbabel

discuss / consider

- 1. Review Doctrinal Point #1 describing the lampstand and its supply of oil. This encouraging vision taught that Israel would be restored to their God-given role as a light of testimony to the world. The lampstand is typical of Christ as the true light in both the tabernacle and the temple in the Old Testament. See Isaiah 49:6. Israel will be the means by which the testimony to the Gentiles will be carried out, even to the ends of the earth. Consider the high privilege and responsibility of God's people, the Jews to be this testimony to the world.
- 2. The flying scroll vision portrays the way that evil will ultimately be exposed and judged. The judgment will be swift. Through the ages, people seem to be able to hide sin and wickedness, but ultimately when the Lord returns all wickedness will be exposed and judged. Sin will not be swept under the rug. Have you brought your sins before the Lord to receive His forgiveness now?
- 3. In the seventh prophetic vision, Zechariah sees two women with wings. What does this means? Wickedness, represented by the woman in the basket is now under restraint, but will eventually be removed and banished. Where organized rebellion against God began at the tower of Babel, there it will end. Wickedness will have run its full cycle. What an encouraging vision for Israel and for us as well.

challenge

"Who has despised the day of small things?" Zechariah 4:10 Bigger and more beautiful is not necessarily better. It is the attitude of heart that counts. If the Lord is in the work and it is being done for Him and by Him, that is what really counts. "Not by might nor by power, but by My Spirit,' says the Lord." Zechariah 4:6 Are you involved in a small ministry? The question is not size or grandeur. The issue is your priorities and attitude of the heart. Is the Lord in the midst? Is He being honored, or are you looking to human might and power? Don't despise the day of small things.

memorize

- 1. They were all given to Zechariah on the same night. He was given a lot of information and insight concerning God's program for the future.
- 2. They reveal both the first coming of Christ and of the second coming when all evil will be judged and Christ will reign supreme.
- 3. Apocalyptic literature is visions of the future. It is highly symbolic in nature.
- 4. It is not easy. A general rule is to see if the visions have already taken place. The rest of scripture helps us distinguish the symbolic and literal.
- 5. Judgment. See, for example, the two mountains of bronze in this portion of scripture. They could be taken symbolically or literally. When the Lord returns, the Mount of Olives literally will be split into two mountains with a valley in between. This could be the Valley of Jehoshaphat where the Lord judges the nations. See Joel 3.

discuss / consider

- 1. Refer to Zechariah 6:1-8. Consider the vision of the horses and riders standing under the direction of the Lord. All the earth is at rest. God is at rest because the nations have been judged. The horses and war chariots have done their work of judgment. Revelation 16 shows that when this judgment takes place at the end of the Battle of Armageddon. This is also called the judgment of the sheep and the goats in Matthew 25:31-46. This is the same judgment of the nations prophesied in Joel 3. Marvel at the confirmation of scripture within the Bible.
- 2. Refer to Zechariah 6:9-15. The crown was placed on the high priest's head, anticipating and foreshadowing the coming of the Man whose name is the BRANCH, the title for the coming Messiah. The BRANCH was both priest and king, thus the uniting of the offices of king and high priest in the Messiah. The Lord Jesus is now our High Priest and now our King, but this symbolic event of Zechariah's time looks forward beyond this church age to when the Lord will return and literally reign as King over this world. Marvel at the prophecy of our Lord's second coming and His reign as King over the entire world.

challenge

Do you know your biblical temples? There are at least seven biblical temples of the Lord:

the two spiritual temples of the Holy Spirit, the believer's body (1 Corinthians 3:16; 6:19-20) and the church, the body of Christ; and the five literal temples of the Lord: Solomon's Temple, Zerubbabel's Temple, Herod's Temple, a Tribulation Temple, and the Millennial Temple (Ezekiel 40-48). The temple spoken of in this portion of scripture is likely the Millennial Temple, which will be built after the Lord returns. The Lord Himself will direct the building of His temple (Zechariah 6:12-13), and believing Jews and Gentiles from around the world will come and participate in building this temple. What will be your part in this building?

memorize

- 1. To ask the priests and prophets if they should continue to keep the fast of the fifth month.
- 2. The destruction of Solomon's Temple by the Babylonians.

- 4. No, but the Lord gave Zechariah the answer.
- 5. In the future when Messiah's kingdom is set up.

discuss / consider

- 1. Zechariah's first message is one of rebuke. He rebukes the people for keeping the fasts, not because they were wrong in themselves, but because of their hypocritical attitude. They were not fasting for the Lord; they were just going through religious motions. The Lord hates religious hypocrisy, then and today. The Lord desires righteousness rather than ritual. Is your heart really in tune with the Lord? Do you really want to worship Him, or are you bored and weary with divine things? Check your heart attitude toward the Lord. See Matthew 6: 21, 33.
- 2. Zechariah's second message is one of repentance. Many people were just going through religious motions when they fasted, and they also were falling back into their old ways of not carrying out social justice, and not showing mercy and compassion to the poor and needy. How do you measure up? How are you showing compassion to the poor and needy?
- 3. Zechariah's third message is one of restoration, both for the near and the far future. The land would be prosperous and the people would be blessed instead of disciplined. All God asked of them was that they practice truth, justice, and peace. The complete fulfillment of this prophecy awaits the second coming of Christ and His millennial kingdom. Then Jerusalem will be called the City of Truth and the Holy Mountain. This certainly isn't the situation today, but it will be! Think of Jerusalem as the City of Peace. What a glorious day that will be!
- 4. Zechariah's fourth message is one of rejoicing. All of the empty fasts will be turned to joyful feasts when the Messiah sets up His kingdom here on this earth. In that day, Israel will be a channel of blessing for the nations of the world. Anticipate that great day!

challenge

The promised wonderful blessings of the future will be accomplished by God in His time. This is God's way. He can do exceedingly abundantly above all that we ask or think (Ephesians 3:20). What seems like a big deal to us is only another day at the office for God. What are you asking for? Expect great things from God!

memorize

Execute true justice, show mercy and compassion...do not oppress others." Zechariah 7:9-10

- 1. The last three Haggai, Zechariah, and Malachi.
- 2. Because they wrote smaller books. Because they were all written after Israel's seventy-year captivity in Babylon.
- 3. Zerubbabel. They began to rebuild Solomon's Temple that had been destroyed by Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon.
- 4. At first, but then the people became discouraged and they quit building.
- 5. God raised up Haggai and Zechariah to minister to the people and motivate them to finish the job of rebuilding the temple. Yes, it worked. The people returned to the work of rebuilding the house of the Lord and the rebuilt temple was completed in 516 B.C.
- 6. He encouraged them in view of the great future that was in store for the nation of Israel.

discuss / consider

- 1. Read Zechariah 9:1-8. Trace the march and conquests that Alexander the Great of Greece would take in 332 B.C. There is a promise amidst these conquests that God made to the Jewish remnant that He Himself would protect them. Indeed, Alexander the Great did not conquer Jerusalem and did not destroy the temple. Alexander the Great came as a conquering hero, but it was by God's choice in order to judge the evil practices of the people. Archaeology has confirmed the destruction as predicted. Even amidst times of war, God gives a grace note to His people. Do you see God's grace note amidst the terrorism of our day?
- 2. Read Zechariah 9:9-10 and note the contrasts between Alexander the Great and the Lord Jesus, the Greater. Alexander the Great came riding on a mighty stallion; Jesus the Greater came riding a lowly donkey. Alexander the Great came as rich and powerful; Jesus the Greater came as poor and meek. Alexander the Great brought fear and dread; Jesus the Greater brought joy and peace. Alexander the Great came as a slayer of his foes; Jesus the Greater came as a Savior of His foes. Alexander the Great came as a foreign king; Jesus the Greater came as the rightful king, Israel's Messiah. Both Alexander and Jesus died at age thirty-three. Alexander the Great was a burned-out war hero; Jesus the Greater is Savior of the world. What a contrast! Aren't you thankful that Jesus the Greater is your Savior and Lord and coming King?

challenge

How do you make decisions? How do you look to the Lord for an answer? Beware of the open and point method. Beware of taking scripture out of context. God does use the Bible as guidance in making decisions, but use the Bible as God intended.

- 1. Chapters 1-6 8 visions Chapters 7-8 - 4 messages Chapters 9-14 - 2 burdens
- 2. To encourage the Jews who had returned from the seventy-year captivity in Babylon.
- 3. Cyrus, the Persian Emperor

- 6. Joseph was put into a waterless pit, but he was preserved and finally set free. Like Joseph, the Jews were prisoners in Babylon, preserved and then set free.
- 7. During a period of Seleucid (Syrian) domination of Israel, Antiochus IV, a ruthless king, came to the throne. He killed thousands of Jews and desecrated the temple, and he attempted to Hellenize all of Israel. It was at this time that a number of godly Jews rose up in opposition and resistance to this ungodly violence. They were led by a priestly family, one of whom won the name, the hammerer or a macabee. Thus, these godly intertestamental Jews became known as the Macabees. They were able to regain a measure of independence.

discuss / consider

- 1. After the death of Alexander the Great, the Greek Empire subdivided into several kingdoms. Two of these kingdoms became very significant in reference to Israel the Seleucid Kingdom (Syria, to the north of Israel) and the Ptolemaic Kingdom (Egypt, to the south of Israel). During the intertestamental period, there was conflict between these two kingdoms. Because Israel was in the middle she was always under the domination of one of these kingdoms. Read Daniel Chapter 11 for some of the details of the wars and political interactions during this time. At this time the Macabees rose up against the domination of the Seleucids and Antiochus IV, and God delivered Israel. The Jews still celebrate this historic event as a special festival known as Hanukah. The Jews would have known of Daniel's prophecies and the fact that the Greek Empire would follow the Persian Empire. Thus, Zechariah's prophecy of Israel's victory over the coming Greeks would be very encouraging. God loves to encourage people with His word then and today. Do you know God's word well enough to receive encouragement for the future?
- 2. The victories of the Macabees over the Greeks foreshadow and anticipate the final conflict, victory, and restoration of Israel to come in the future. In "that day," the Lord will defend His people and save them to bring them into His Millennial Kingdom. Review the time-line following the Rapture to understand when "that day" will come.

challenge

1. Read Zechariah 9:16. The godly are promised that they will be like jewels in a crown lifted like a banner over His land. In context, this is a promise to the faithful Jews who have come out of the Tribulation and have entered the Millennial Kingdom of Christ. It can, however, be applied to faithful believers today. Will you be one of the faithful who will sparkle as a jewel in the kingdom of Christ? See 2 Timothy 2:11-13 and Romans 8:17.

memorize

"I will set your prisoners free from the waterless pit. Return to the stronghold, you prisoners of hope." Zechariah 9:11-12

discuss / consider

- 1. Before the Lord returns set up His kingdom on this earth, there will be once again idolatry in the nation of Israel. In His Olivet Discourse, Jesus said that during the Tribulation Period, the anti-Christ will set up an image in the temple. The prophet Daniel called him "the abomination of desolation" (Daniel 11:31). Revelation chapter 13 makes it clear that both Jews and Gentiles will worship this image. The false shepherds and leaders (Zechariah 10:3) refer primarily to those operating under the false messiah or the anti-Christ of the last days. At this time all nations will be gathered against Israel for war (Zechariah 12:3). What a dreadful and discouraging scene! Then comes the good news! The Lord will visit His flock and there will be a spiritual restoration of the nation Israel. Many will believe in the Messiah whom they once rejected. Then the Lord will return and lead His redeemed people in victory over all evil and enemy forces. What an encouraging and glorious scene!
- 2. Note the four titles that are given to our Lord as Messiah in Zechariah 10:4. Consider the meaning of each title.
- 3. Read Zechariah 10:6-12. These are promises made to the Jewish people and they are still valid today. Like a shepherd, the Lord will whistle for His flock, and the Jews will return from the far countries of this world. The best part is that Israel will be restored to the Lord. What a great prophecy! The return of the Jews to Israel today is now in unbelief, but in the future it will be in faith.

challenge

In context, God's whistle is for the return of Israel to the land and to the Lord. But it has application for us. Is God whistling for you to come and receive His free gift of salvation in Christ, or to come back to Him if you have wandered away? Don't delay!

discuss / consider

- 1. The leaders of Israel were not caring for the sheep (remember the Scribes and Pharisees). These were the unfaithful rulers and false shepherds of the nation. In Zechariah's role play, the two staffs were broken, showing that God's protection was being removed so that the Romans would be free to sweep in against Jerusalem, and any unity in Israel would be impossible. There would be world-wide dispersion. God holds spiritual leaders of a nation responsible for the care of the flock. What about the false and unfaithful shepherds today? God still holds spiritual leaders responsible for the care of the flock. They will know God's judgment.
- 2. The anti-Christ will be accepted by the nation Israel. The good news is that this false shepherd will be conquered and removed. When the Lord comes He will cut down and eliminate the anti-Christ of the last days. See 2 Thessalonians 2: 8. Not all the Jewish people will turn to the anti-Christ, and not all Gentiles will receive the mark of the beast. There will be 144,000 Jewish evangelists of the Tribulation Period who will lead many Jews to saving faith in the true Messiah who is returning to set up His kingdom. See Revelation 7. Could you make a time chart of the last days?

challenge

God called Zechariah to make a dramatic presentation to illustrate the truth He wanted to convey to the people. Dramatic presentations can be very effective. God chose to use this method not only with Zechariah, but also with Jeremiah and Ezekiel. Re-think your position if you dislike dramatic presentations. Many people can be reached with truths of scripture by this method.

- 1. The people of Israel had returned from their seventy-year captivity in Babylon. This burden of Zechariah was given to encourage them and to motivate them to finish the job of rebuilding the temple.
- 2. Zerubbabel
- 3. It predicted the completion of the rebuilt temple and it looked forward to the glorious future of Israel under the kingship of the Messiah.
- 4. Because the Messiah was rejected by Israel when the Lord came the first time. Some of the prophecies await fulfillment until the Lord comes a second time.
- 5. The Rapture of the Church. It is imminent; it could take place at any time.
- 6. The Rapture of the Church will be followed by the Tribulation Period of seven years, followed by the return of the Lord to this earth to set up His earthly kingdom, which will extend for 1,000 years (called the Millennium).

discuss / consider

- 1. In the end times, all nations will be gathered against Israel, whose capital is Jerusalem. In light of current events, it's easy to see how this could come about in the near future. However, the Lord has the last word, and the key to Israel's deliverance will be the Lord Himself. The nations are no match for the Lord, who will defend Israel and deliver the land of Judah and the city of Jerusalem from all her enemies. This is the time in the prophecy of Daniel chapter 2 when the image of Gentile power is crushed to powder and blown away. Then the dynasty of David will be re-established and the Lord Jesus will reign. Jerusalem will finally be a city of true peace. What a great day that will be!
- 2. During the Tribulation Period, there will be a great spiritual awakening among the Jewish people. (Refer Romans chapter 11 in this connection.) The groundwork for this awakening is taking place even today. God is at work. During the Tribulation, the 144,000 Jewish evangelists of Revelation chapter 7 will preach the gospel of the coming kingdom and the return of the Messiah. Many will turn to the Lord at that time. Then the Lord will return, and Israel will look on her Messiah whom they pierced (Zechariah 12:10). This is more than the prediction of the piercing that would take place at the crucifixion of Christ. It is that, but this prophecy looks on to the Second Coming of Christ, when believing Israel will mourn with great mourning when they see the Lord. What a moment it will be when Jesus returns and Israel receives Him as their Messiah, the Messiah they once rejected!

challenge

Mourning for the Messiah is on an individual basis (Zechariah 12:12-14). Salvation is always an individual matter, and no one can repent for you. Have you come to the place in your life where you realize that the Lord Jesus died for your sins personally? Have you mourned the death of Christ by yourself?

discuss / consider

- 1. Refer to Zechariah 1:1. A fountain shall be opened, not created or made or come into being for sin, but opened. The fountain is already there, but in that day, it will be opened for Israel and the benefits will become available. This fountain is the work of Christ on the cross in dying for the sins of the world. That work is finished; it has been accomplished. But right now Israel is blind to this fountain. A veil lies over their heart, but in a coming day that veil will be taken away. The fountain will be opened and they will see the fountain of the pierced Messiah, the fountain that was there all the time. Question: Are you blind to this fountain, or are drinking at it?
- 2. Read Zechariah 13:2, Revelation 9:20-21. Consider the idolatry of Israel that is yet to come. Remember, however, that in "that day" all of this idolatry will be cut off and removed from the land. In the meantime, how about the idolatry in your life?
- 3. "Awake, O sword, against My Shepherd,' says the Lord" Zechariah 13:7. As a result of Israel's rejection of the Messiah, the Lord was crucified and the flock was scattered. The crucified Lord is the means by which national cleansing will be available for Israel. Have you understood John 3:16 personally?

challenge

The fountain will be opened to Israel in the future, but it's available for anyone now. This is the fountain of cleansing from sin, established at Calvary. Coming to the fountain means coming to Christ as an individual and acknowledging that you are a sinner in need of cleansing. Have you been to that fountain?

discuss / consider

- 1. Read Zechariah 14:3-4. All nations will be gathered against Jerusalem, and when it seems that all hope is lost, the Lord will return. He will return to the literal Mount of Olives. At that time He will deliver His people (that is, the believing remnant in Jerusalem who are still living and have not been martyred. Read Acts 1:11. The Lord left at His ascension from the Mount of Olives. He will return to the Mount of Olives. Read Zechariah 14:5. Who are the holy ones who will come with the Lord? Probably angels and saints (believers). Remember, we of the Church leave this earth at the Rapture to be with the Lord during the Tribulation Period. Then we're coming back with the Lord to reign with Him in His earthly Millennial Kingdom. See 1 Thessalonians 3:13. Doesn't the anticipation of this thrill your soul?
- 2. Read Zechariah 14:4-5. The Mount of Olives will be split in two. When the Lord Jesus returns to the Mount of Olives there will be a great earthquake, and a large valley will be formed between the two halves of the mountain. This valley will become the means of escape for the believing remnant trapped in Jerusalem. Jerusalem will become the highest point and the focal point of the whole area. There will be fresh subterranean waters flowing out from Jerusalem both toward the Dead Sea in the East and the Mediterranean Sea in the West. These waters will make the Judean wilderness a very fertile area. See Zechariah 14:8 and Ezekiel 47. Beyond the earthquake and the topographical changes, there will also be cosmic disturbances. Read about these in Zechariah 14:6-7 and Matthew 24:29-30. Stand in awe at the prospect of this time!

challenge

The Lord can bring about great changes in a short time. Maybe you are in circumstances where it looks like there is no way out; it's a losing situation from the world's perspective. The Lord can bring about great changes for you in a short time. Put your trust in Him and commit the situation to Him. Read Zechariah 14 again and be encouraged.

- 1. The bad news was of that there would be panic and plague on the nations. The good news was that great blessing would come with the future celebration of the Feast of Tabernacles.
- 2. The Rapture of the Church, when believers met the Lord in the air will come at any time; then the seven-year Tribulation Period; then the Millennial Kingdom of Christ set up here on this earth for 1000 years.
- 3. Bad news the Tribulation Period; good news the Millennium.
- 4. "Everyone" refers to the living believers that come out of the Great Tribulation and enter the Millennial Kingdom of Christ. These are the sheep of the nations that passed the test of the Lord's judgment of the nations, the judgment of the sheep and the goats. See Matthew 25:31-34.
- 5. No, many people will be born during this period, but not everyone who is born will become a believer.
- 6. Satan will deceive and rally together the unbelievers of the Millennium from the nations and they will go up to Jerusalem to make war against the land.

discuss / consider

- 1. The Lord will strike the armies of the nations who are gathered against Jerusalem with panic and plague. Recall in Judges chapters 7-8, how the Lord used panic and confusion in the days of Gideon when He defeated the Midianites. The Lord chooses His methods for every occasion to defeat the enemy. When His time comes, He will win a great victory for Jerusalem.
- 2. Ezekiel Chapters 45-46 tell us that biblical feasts will be celebrated during the Millennium. The Feast of Tabernacles in emphasized in Zechariah 14:16 because it is the only one typically fulfilled in the Kingdom age. Review the seven biblical feasts that God gave to Israel and their fulfillment:
 - a. Passover, the first biblical feast, typically fulfilled with the death of Christ
 - b. Feast of Unleavened Bread, typically fulfilled in the separation and communion of saints
 - c. Feast of Firstfruits, typically fulfilled with the resurrection of Christ
 - d. Feast of Pentecost, typically fulfilled with the coming of the Holy Spirit
 - e. Feast of Trumpets will be typically fulfilled with the regathering of Israel to the land
 - f. Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur) will be typically fulfilled with the national repentance and cleansing of Israel
 - g. Feast of Tabernacles will be typically fulfilled in the kingdom itself.

Note that the first four feast were all typically fulfilled with the first coming of Christ, and the last three feasts will be typically fulfilled with the second coming of Christ. In that day, everything in Jerusalem will be cleansed and dedicated to the Lord. Israel will truly be the Holy Land. And this wonderful condition will ripple out around the world because the Lord's kingdom is universal. Allelujah!
